Milk Markets Overview

Market Conditions

Market sentiment across dairy commodities remains subdued. Butter, skimmed milk powder (SMP) and cheese have all experienced further downward pressure, although the pace of decline has eased slightly. As year-end approaches, both buyers and sellers are showing limited interest in holding inventory, making any near-term recovery unlikely.

Cheese markets continue to soften, with mozzarella and cheddar both trending lower.

Global Supply Dynamics

Milk production remains strong across key regions, driven by favourable farm-level margins and herd expansion:

- EU (July): +1.5%
- U.S. (August): +3.2%
- New Zealand (August): +2.5%
- Australia (August): -3.0%

In the EU, output has been supported by delayed calving following last year's bluetongue outbreak. The US dairy herd has reached record levels, reinforcing global supply pressure. In New Zealand, recent auction results have dampened sentiment, despite a relatively strong milk price forecast early in the season.

Global Demand Trends

Global dairy exports have declined only marginally, but EU performance remains weak due to reduced price competitiveness. New Zealand has seen a drop in cheese exports, while the US continues to gain market share, supported by more competitive pricing.

Some US origin dairy products are now entering European markets as buyers seek cost efficiencies. While recent price corrections in Europe could support a rebound in global demand, there is currently no clear evidence of recovery.

Key Tips From the October Farm Walks

Successful Dry Off

- Hygiene, Hygiene drying off is almost like a surgical procedure
- Be prepared clip tails, get milk recording done, have the right equipment – head torch, clean apron, gloves
- Use milk recordings to determine eligibility for Selective Dry Cow Therapy (SDCT) – average lactation less than 50,000, all milk recordings under 200,000 and no case of clinical mastitis
- If a cow is a free flowing milker, has teat end damage or lies on passageways they are not suitable for SDCT

Labour Efficiency & Facilities

- · Having a simple system is key to labour efficiency.
- The start time of evening milking has a significant impact on the length of your working day. Can this be brought forward?
- Use the dry period to organise workstations, calf shed, calving utensils & fencing. Has everything a

place and do you/staff member know where to find it when needed?

- Target 8 rows or less in the parlour. Automatic cluster removers, gates operated from any point in the pit and autowash will improve labour efficiency at milking
- Ensure your facilities provide a safe environment to work in.

Economic Breeding Index (EBI)

- Change in base cow moved from an animal born in 2005 to born in 2015 and milk recorded in 2017, to 2019
- Economic values of the EBI have also been updated to reflect the rise in costs over the last number of years.
- With the economic changes and the base change the average reduction in EBI is €83
- Kerry Agribusiness milk suppliers in the top 20% EBI have higher litres/cow, higher fat and protein percentage, higher milk solids/cow and are receiving a higher milk price compared with the average or bottom 20% EBI



The Critical Role of Soil Sampling in Nutrient Management Planning

Soil sampling is the foundation of an effective Nutrient Management Plan (NMP). It provides essential data on soil pH, phosphorus (P) and potassium (K), enabling informed decisions on fertiliser, slurry and lime applications.

Beyond its agronomic benefits, soil sampling is a key regulatory requirement. Farmers with a stocking rate exceeding 130 kg of organic nitrogen per hectare are legally obliged to maintain valid soil samples. These samples demonstrate the need for phosphorus; without them, phosphorus levels are assumed to be at Index 4, meaning no phosphorus can be applied.

For participants in the ACRES scheme, soil sampling is also mandatory. A minimum of one sample must be

taken for every 5 hectares. All samples must be less than four years old (any taken before 15 September 2022 are now expired). To ensure accuracy, samples should ideally be collected at least three months after applying slurry, manure or chemical P or K.

Since 15 September 2025, all soil samples must include the corresponding LPIS or georeferenced identifier. This requirement improves traceability and ensures nutrient planning accuracy on a field-by-field basis.

A well-prepared NMP ensures nutrients are applied in the right place and at the right rate. Correcting soil pH improves nutrient availability and fertiliser efficiency, while slurry should be targeted to areas with the greatest P and K requirements.

By following an NMP, farmers can remain compliant with nitrogen and phosphorus allowances, optimise nutrient use, reduce waste and maximise grass growth.

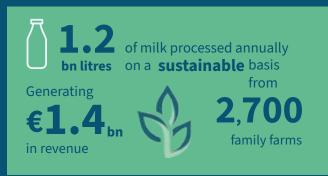
