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Milk Market Overview

Dairy markets remain under pressure. Cheese has experienced a sharp decline compared to last month for 2025 dispatch. Market fundamentals indicate prices may soften further before recovery, yet buyers are locking in volumes well into 2026 as current levels align with budget expectations. Sellers, however, remain hesitant to commit forward at these low prices, anticipating potential improvement next year.

Global Supply

Milk production continues at elevated levels, driven by strong farm margins, particularly across Europe, the U.S. and New Zealand. Additional income from cattle sales into the beef sector is further supporting dairy farm finances.

Global Demand

Food service demand remains sluggish worldwide and consumer sentiment is weighing on retail performance. While lower dairy commodity prices are expected to stimulate demand, this has yet to materialise in reported figures.

Winter feeding starts with Silage Quality

As the grazing season draws to a close, now is the time to assess silage quality for the winter months ahead. Silage is the primary forage during this period, so understanding what's in the yard is essential for planning.

Recent NIR forage testing across farms in the KDI catchment area has shown excellent results. The main quality parameters to consider are Dry Matter (DM%), Digestibility (DMD), UFL (Feed Energy Value) and Crude Protein.

Average Results from the past month include:

- Dry Matter: 33%
- DMD: Above 72
- UFL: 0.85
- Crude Protein: 15.4%

These figures provide a strong starting point, but remember: all parameters matter when formulating diets. Nutritional requirements vary by animal group so silage analysis should guide your winter feeding strategy.

Young cattle need substantial protein and energy during winter to support growth in frame and height.

For weanling heifers to reach 60% of mature herd body weight by the start of the breeding season, they should achieve a live weight gain of 0.75 kg daily over the winter.

Based on average silage results in the area, weanlings would require supplementation with an 18% crude protein concentrate and a minimum UFL of 0.95 to achieve this daily liveweight gain.

Dry Cows

- · Ideal BCS at drying off: 3.0
- · Aim for calving BCS: 3.25
- Based on the average silage results to-date cows could potentially gain 0.5 BCS over an 8-week dry cow period.

Plan early to secure staff for spring

In Crecora, Co. Limerick, Niall and Jerry Moloney manage a 170 cow spring calving herd. Two years ago, faced with a growing workload and a young family, they decided to hire a full time employee.

Niall emphasises that attracting the right candidate starts with a competitive package. Key elements include, fair pay, flexibility and regular working hours. He advises understanding your competition and offering something extra.

"If you're trying to attract young people, you're competing with pubs and shops. If you can guarantee they won't miss training, that's something a pub or shop can't offer"

Act Early: Waiting until February is too late. Adequate lead time allows for training before the busy calving season. While some farmers seek experience, Niall focuses on finding someone that is eager to learn, prioritising attitude over experience. Hiring for the first time brings challenges, requiring new skills.

Niall highlights two essentials:

- Clear Communication: Any issues we had were due to poor communication.
 It's something you improve over time.
- Timely Payment: Pay your staff well and on time - It's Key

Finally, plan how you'll use up the time freed up by hiring. Avoid duplicating tasks, instead focus on management and strategy.

"Having someone well-trained adds value and turnover to your business. It gives you headspace to think strategically."


